Schools and not for profit organisations can apply for grants of up to £12,000 for projects that encourage young people's interest in the the Arts, Crafts and Architecture, Literacy and STEM subjects. All applications are expected to link in with either the National Curriculum or with recognised qualifications. Funding is available via two funding streams.



The small grants programme (grants under £4,000) supports state schools and small registered charities which require a small amount of pump-priming in order for projects to take place. The programme is a rolling one, with meetings at roughly two-monthly intervals throughout the year.

The large grants programme (grants up to £12,000) is aimed at larger scale education programmes.

The next closing date for applications to the large grants programme is the 31st January 2019.

Royal Geographic Society



Two grants of £1,000 each are available to fund innovative geography teaching at secondary level. The aim of the grants is to enable imaginative, innovative or creative teaching materials to be developed. The grants will be awarded to teacher – higher education partnerships. Ideally these will comprise one school teacher and one lecturer/researcher from a UK Higher Education Institution. The funding is being made available through the Innovative Geography Teaching Grants. Every year, the Society identifies an area of research which is either based upon a timely issue or approach. The aim is to serve both geography pupils and the wider teaching community through the creation of teaching materials on this particular issue. The materials produced will be published on the Society's website.

European Youth Foundation

EYF is offering grants of up to €50,000 to support the work of international non-governmental youth organisations (NGOs) based in the 50 signatory countries to the European Cultural Convention (47 member states of Council of Europe plus Kazakhstan, Holy See and Belarus).

Strategic priorities for the programme are decided biannually and for 2018 – 2019 these are:



- Access to rights
- Youth participation and youth work
- Inclusive and peaceful societies.

Grants can cover an international one-off activity, structural grants or an annual work plan. Eligible organisations can apply for a grant of €25,000 per year for up to two years work. Where a grant is awarded for 2018, the same amount will be awarded in principle for 2019, based on the validation by the EYF of an interim report after one year. NGOs wishing to apply for a grant must first be registered online.

Co-op - Youth Loneliness

Charities and other not for profit organisations have until 5pm on the 26th September 2018 to apply for grants of up to £80,000 to tackle youth loneliness in the 30% most deprived part of England. Successful applicants will receive funding to explore youth loneliness in greater depth, test youth-led innovations within their existing provision, and share their learning as part of a national network.



The funding is being made available through the Big Lottery Fund's Building Connections Fund Youth strand and will be delivered by the Co-op Foundation. The total amount of funding available is £2 million. Grants can also support projects that mainly benefit young people with any one or more of the following circumstances: Being a carer, Being unemployed or precariously employed, Experiencing bereavement, Having a disability or long-term health condition, Having been in the care system.

Organisations can apply for up to £80,000, as follows: Up to £10,000 (to be spent between December 2018 and March 2019) to engage young people in co-designing innovations to improve the impact of existing provision on tackling loneliness. Up to £70,000 (to be spent between April 2019 and March 2021) to implement and evaluate these innovations.

Successful applicants will be announced in December 2018.

Marvellous Family Grants are awarded to families facing financial hardship whilst caring for a child with a serious illness. Grants of up to £1,000 can fund a variety of essential items and services including (but not limited to) specialist equipment, creative therapies, hospital travel expenses, everyday items to improve the child's quality of life, attending medical/support group conference, social activities and memberships.

Marvellous Family grants are open to any family residing in the UK with a child who has a serious illness that could be life-limiting as described by the following criteria:



Group 1 – Life threatening conditions for which curative treatment may be feasible but can fail. (e.g. epilepsy, irreversible organ failures of heart, liver, kidneys.)

Group 2 – Conditions where premature death is inevitable. (e.g. cystic fibrosis.)

Group 3 – Progressive conditions without curative treatment options. (e.g. Batten disease, mucopolysaccharidoses, muscular dystrophy.)

Group 4 – Irreversible but non-progressive conditions causing severe disability leading to susceptibility to health complications and likelihood of premature death. (e.g. sickle cell disease, cerebral palsy, multiple disabilities such as brain or spinal cord insult.)

Group 5 – Syndromes without a name (SWAN) causing severe, chronic disability or illness.

Applications must be completed by health or social care professionals on behalf the family and are considered at monthly meetings.

Baily Thomas Charitable Fund

The fund is a registered charity which was established to provide both research and project funding in the area of severe learning difficulties, including autism for both children and adults.

Grants are made to cover capital projects and core costs to include staff costs, general running and office costs at charitable organisations, schools and centres.

Projects funded include:

- Capital works for residential, nursing and respite care, and schools
- Employment schemes including woodwork, crafts, printing and horticulture
- Play schemes and play therapy schemes
- Day and social activities centres including building costs and running costs
- Support for families, including respite schemes
- Independent living schemes
- Support in the community schemes
- Snoezelen rooms.

Applications will only be considered from voluntary organisations which are registered charities or are associated with a registered charity. Schools and Parent Teacher Associations and Industrial & Provident Societies can also apply. Funding in the past has ranged in value from £250 to £150,000.

The next deadline for applications seeking funding in excess of £10,000 is the 1st December 2018.

Theatres Trust's -Theatres Grants Scheme

Open to applications for capital grants of up to £5,000. Organisations eligible to apply will be running small theatres, have UK charitable or not-for-profit legal structures and be:

~Owned or manage theatres with titles or signed leases of more than 5 years on buildings ~Running a regular theatre programme of professional, community and/or amateur work presenting no less than 30 performances a year~Able to provide certified or audited accounts for at least two years



Priority is given to projects that address urgent building repairs, improve operational viability, introduce environmental improvements and enhance physical accessibility. The scheme can also be used to help lever in other sources of investment, particularly philanthropic support. Applications for technical equipment and refurbishment of soft furnishings are a low priority for the scheme.

The only source of funding available in the UK dedicated to cataloguing and unlocking archives. 'Archives Revealed' comprises two funding strands:



- Cataloguing Grants, awarding grants of up to £40,000 for archives to create catalogues of important archival collections.
- Scoping Grants, offering grants of up to £3,000 helping archives conduct collection analysis to support development of plans for future cataloguing priorities and projects.

Grants will be available to the following UK organisations:

- Public sector bodies; registered charities; other not-for-profit organisations
- Organisations that make their collections accessible to people outside their organisation
- Organisations that have access to professional archive expertise
- Organisations with owned or deposited collections where public access can be guaranteed for ten years of the project end date.

Warm Homes Fund

The Fund is a £150million fund funded by the National Grid and administered by Affordable Warmth Solutions (AWS). The fund aims to help make households warmer, healthier and cheaper to heat.

Running over 3-years and providing capital funding for the installation of affordable heating solutions in fuel poor households who do not use mains gas as their primary heating fuel. This can include: Condensing Gas, Oil and LPG boilers, Air and Ground Source Heat Pumps, Bio Mass Boilers; etc.

The Fund is open to bids from local authorities, housing associations and their partners and is split in to three categories focusing on urban, rural and health-related solutions.

This funding round will focus on rural homes and communities – some of the most severely fuel poor households are those without a mains gas connection in rural locations.

Successful proposals will highlight: The number of fuel poor households supported, Strategic fit with the Governments Fuel Poverty Strategy, Value for money, The benefit created i.e. energy efficiency increases and bill savings, Strength of delivery plans, project management and assurance of delivery.

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Institute of Physics

Schools and colleges can apply for grants of up to £600 for small-scale projects or events linked to the teaching or promotion of physics and engineering to pupils aged 5 – 19. Grants can be used to support a wide range of projects such as school-based science weeks, extracurricular activities, science clubs, careers event or a visit from a working physicist or engineer.



Grants may be used for the following project-related purposes: materials / resources; transport; marketing and publicity; other purposes deemed appropriate by the judges; and supply cover (in certain circumstances).

Schools, colleges and youth groups can receive up to 80% towards the costs of providing environmental outreach education for groups of disadvantaged young people through the Field Studies Council's Kids Fund. The Field Studies Council is an independent educational charity committed to raising awareness about the natural world and works through a network of residential and day Centres in the UK to provide outreach education and training.

There are two types of Kids Fund course:

- Wildlife and Environment focusing on wildlife habitats and the environment with team building activities and;
- Eco Adventure which combines environmental and personally challenging activities.

Groups who meet one of the following criteria will be eligible:

- Disadvantaged young people aged 4-18 years (or up to 25 years for those with special needs).
- Voluntary youth groups (either run by voluntary leaders, managed by a voluntary organisation, a registered charity)
- OR
- School groups may apply if they are aiming to provide benefits which are additional to the statutory school curriculum or clearly show added value, depth and breadth to the taught curriculum. FSC Kids Fund will not pay for young people to attend standard curriculum-focused FSC courses.

All applicants must be based in the UK, Isle of Man, Channel Isles and Republic of Ireland.


One free staff/adult place is provided for every 12 young people; additional adults pay 20% +VAT. This includes all equipment, tuition and waterproof hire costs. Food and accommodation are included for residential courses.

Dan Maskell Tennis Trust

Grants of up to £1,500 are available to special schools, disability groups and associations, etc for equipment and specialist wheelchairs to enable disabled people to play tennis.



Individuals can apply for grants of up to £500. Individuals can receive support for sports wheelchairs, tennis rackets, coaching lessons with a Lawn Tennis Association (LTA) licensed coach or course fees for official LTA development/coaching courses. Groups can apply for: Wheelchairs; Court hire;

Coaching fees; and equipment packages which will include:~Rackets ~Balls ~Mini net ~Coaching aids such as: cones and throw down marker lines.

In the case of wheelchairs, a deposit will be required; for individuals, the amount of deposit required will depend on the wheelchair type requested, clubs will need to raise a deposit of £800. The next closing date for applications is the 1st October.

The Weavers' Company

Small registered charities can apply for grants of up to £15,000 for projects working with:

HM Government—Rough Sleepers

The Government is making available £50million across England (outside London) up to 2020/21 through the Move On Fund. The fund is part of a package of measures that have been announced through the Government's new Rough Sleeping Strategy.

The Move On Fund aims to free up hostel and refuge spaces by increasing the availability of affordable move-on, or second stage housing, for rough sleepers and those in hostel accommodation, and victims of domestic abuse currently living in refuges who are ready to leave this type of provision but might otherwise not be in a position to access the next stage of housing.

Bidding for the Move On Fund will go live from mid-September 2018, and will remain open to receive new applications until 30 September 2020 or until funding is fully committed, whichever occurs first.

The Aviva Community Fund

opens for applications on the 11th September 2018. Community organisations and schools will be able to apply for funding of up to £25,000 to support projects falling into one of the following three categories:

- Environment;
- Health and Wellbeing;
- Skills for Life.

There are four funding levels:

- Up to £1,000 (400 awards)
- Up to £5,000 (78 awards)
- Up to £10,000 (44 awards)
- Up to £25,000 (16 awards)

Applicants will need support from their community for their application in the form of votes and the most voted for applications will go through to the final to be judged. Every finalist in the £5,000, £10,000 or £25,000 funding levels that does not win an award will receive £500. All projects also have the chance to raise more money for their project through a crowdfunding campaign that will run in parallel with their Aviva Community Fund campaign.

The fund is open to individuals, schools and not-for-profit organisations meeting the Eligibility Criteria. Applicants under the age of 18 (but over 13 as at 14th August 2018) can submit an entry to the Awards but must provide the consent of an appropriate adult associated with the project they are entering.

Projects funded in the last round included:

- Urmston Hockey Club – Health and wellbeing / up to £1,000 category: The funding will buy a new junior goalkeeping kit and equipment for the junior section
- Balfour Primary School, Brighton – Skills for Life £1,001 – £5,000 category: Funding to improve the Foundation Stage Outdoor Learning Environment

has partnered with the Postcode Community Trust to offer over 400 grants of £500 to small charities and community groups across the UK through its Magic Little Grants Fund.

Grants will be awarded to projects that meet either of the following themes:

- Overcoming barriers to participation in physical activities in creative ways
- Increasing social cohesion through developing access to sports and other recreational activities

Grants can be used to support the general running costs of new and existing sports and physical activities. For example, this could include: Facilities hire, Kit & equipment, Coaching qualifications and Other volunteer expenses

The fund is open to Localgiving registered charitable organisations operating within Great Britain (excluding Northern Ireland) with an annual income of under £50,000 that are running or planning to run a project that will encourage people to engage in some form of physical activity to help to improve their physical and mental health and well-being.



Organisations that are not already a member of Localgiving are required to complete the Localgiving registration process before completing the application. Those awarded a grant will also receive an annual Local Giving membership with £96.

Foyle Foundation

Priority will be given to primary schools and to funding library books. The Foundation will also consider contributions towards e-readers, library software, necessary IT equipment and specialist seating/desks.

Preference will be given to schools which can clearly demonstrate that their library can be maintained and renewed in the future. The average grant made under this programme is between £3,000 and £10,000. Applications will be strengthened if the PTA/Friends group can support the project.
